AREA STUDIES COURSES

ANTH 603

Anthropology - Shamanism Past and Present (3 / S) Spring 2015

This course explores shamanism, broadly defined as the practice of gaining insight through the use of ecstatic techniques (dance, drumming, trance, vision quests, and the use of psychotropic substances) for the purpose of interpreting existence and healing illnesses, through a consideration of theories and evidence for its practice from Upper Paleolithic times to the present day. Examples from the ancient cultures of Asia, Europe, Africa, Australia, and the Americas are used to explore current theoretical approaches in order to identify shamans and shamanism in the past. Issues of identifying shamans and shamanism in art and archaeological contexts are discussed. The course also explores the role that shamanism plays in a wide variety of cultures. The principal goal of the course is to provide a reasoned, critical interpretation of shamanism in the context of contemporary debates about its definition and active practice. Prerequisite: ANTH 108/308 or ANTH 110/310 or ANTH 160/360.

Historical Linguistics (officially: "Seminar in Ethnolinguistics")

Meets: Wednesdays 10.00-12.30 in Fraser 633

Professor: Dr. Arienne M. Dwyer

Description:

Historical (or diachronic) linguistics investigates the development of languages over time. Some patterns of grammar are better explained diachronically, which entails developing a plausible narrative of language change from a series of synchronic samples; it can also entail reconstruction of an ancestral proto-language. Historical and comparative linguistics has developed rapidly in the last two decades, integrating concepts from linguistic typology and evolutionary biology to analyze and explain language change. This introductory graduate level course focuses on non-Indo-European languages, and offers extensive hands-on work in the types and methods of language change, including recent computational methods in quantitative historical linguistics.

Prerequisites: At least a graduate-level introductory linguistics course.

ARCH 540

Architecture - Gbl Hist Arch I:Orig Indst Rv (3 / GE3H) Spring 2015

The first unit of the two-part survey history course explores the historical changes of architecture in relation to civilizational change, techno-spatial experiments and town-building efforts, from the earliest evidence of human dwelling to the beginning of the industrial revolution. Emphasis is on the architecture as an integrated development of commercial, technological, and ideological transferences among different regions, nascent religious groups and evolving political enterprises. In regard to the geographical and geopolitical regions, the course includes South and Central America, Europe, Classical Greece and Italy, Asia Minor, North Africa and Asia. Explores the major communication theories and research in the East Asian cultural contexts by focusing on the Chinese, Japanese, and Korean cultures. Examines, from a broader perspective, certain cultural values (e.g. harmony, hierarchy, conservatism, and modernism) upheld in East Asian cultures and their influences on people's communicative behaviors in an age of

globalization. Students explore issues of history, identity, verbal and non-verbal symbols, stereotypes, prejudice, values and thought patterning systems in the East Asian cultural context from a communicative perspective. This course is designed as a bridge course and meets with a graduate level section of the same title. Prerequisite: COMS 246.

The main goal is to gain knowledge of the modern Chinese-speaking world through the mediation of literature. We will also screen filmic adaptations of literary works to examine the close connection between modern fiction and cinema. Students are expected to nurture a sensibility to literary and visual texts and a critical consciousness in cross-cultural context. For 519 students, secondary readings will also be provided for a better understanding of the critical issues in contemporary Chinese literature, society and history.

No Chinese language skill is necessary for this course and not prior familiarity with China or East Asia is assumed.
