Emphasis is on the architecture as an integrated development of commercial, technological, and ideological transferences among different regions, nascent religious groups and evolving political enterprises. In regard to the geographical and geopolitical regions, the course includes South and Central America, Europe, Classical Greece and Italy, Asia Minor, North Africa and Asia. # HA 543

History of Art - Spc Stdy 20-21st-Cntry Art: (1-6/H) Fall 2015

This lecture course charts the dynamic transformation of Chinese art and visual culture from the late imperial Qing dynasty (1644–1911) at the conclusion of the 19<sup>th</sup> century through the early Republican era (1911–1949) and the founding of the People's Republic (1949–present), to the advent of the Contemporary Chinese art world in the early 2000s. Through a wide range of

media including oil painting, ink-and-brush painting, photography, woodblock printing, film, installation, video, and performance art, the course will contextualize the various "revolutions" of Chinese art over the last century within the sweeping socio-cultural changes that have transformed China into a major economic and political power today.

Key topics include the history and institutions of the GATT-WTO system, accession to the WTO, dispute settlement under WTO rules, regulation of import duties, rules on customs classification and valuation, non-tariff barriers, statutory forms of relief from import competition, government regulation of export trade, regional trade regimes, and ideological and policy issues relating to trade liberalization and globalization. This course complements (but is independent of) International Commerce and Investment and is the basis for more advanced study on international trade law.
