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# LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR



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The Center for East Asian Studies (CEAS) had a wonderful kickoff to the 2022-2023 academic year. It started with the news that we had been awarded a nearly \$2 million U.S. Department of Education Title VI grant for 2022-2026 (National Resource Center and Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowship, combined) as well as a Laurasian Institution JOI (Japan Outreach Initiative) grant to host Yoshie Hisatomi for the next two years. Thanks to the Title VI grant, we were able to hire Japanese popular culture specialist Dr. Linda Galvane and her partner Dr. Thomas McDonald. The JOI grant has enabled us to expand our Japan-related outreach programs, including the resumption of the Lawrence-Hiratsuka sister city exchange program,

In fall 2022, CEAS hosted its first in-person regional conference, the 71st Midwest Conference on Asian Affairs (MCAA), in the post-COVID period. The three-day conference welcomed more than 250 registered attendees. CEAS also organized a film series focused on public health in the fall and held a two-day symposium on the same topic in spring 2023. At these academic meetings, faculty and graduate scholars had interdisciplinary and cross-regional dialogues.


Our community events enjoyed superb attendance. Three major events—a harvest moon viewing event in the fall, a new year's party, and a kite festival in the spring—attracted hundreds of parents, children, and community members to enjoy East Asian food, music, and culture.

The center is excited about further expanding our strengths in the upcoming year. We have just launched our Tibetan and Uyghur tuition-waiver fellowship program to enrich these Least Commonly Taught Languages (LCTLs). KU uniquely offers 2 years of Tibetan and 3 years of Uyghur language courses. KU is also one of 10 U.S. universities that offer 5 levels of Korean language programs, as well as a major and a minor. Thanks to the Korean Foundation, we will search for a Korean literature specialist who can start teaching in fall 2024.

CEAS's joyful and productive year was impossible without community support. I would like to thank CEAS's advisory board members, East Asianists on campus and beyond, and each individual and organization who supported our activities. I am also grateful for the efforts of the CEAS staff team. Former CEAS Assistant Director and FLAS Coordinator Amanda Snider moved on to another job in April, She trained our new outreach coordinator, Mego Londeen, and transferred her other roles and duties to our new assistant director, Ayako Mizumura. LaGretia Copp remains as our program specialist. I believe the new CEAS staff team is as strong as ever.

CHRISTOPHER ANDERSON, Finance, completed his fifth year as associate dean for undergraduate programs at the KU School of Business. Since September 2022, he has been the director of the Global Business Studies Center promoting study abroad and global engagement. He was a visiting scholar at Chongqing University's School of Economics & Business Administration in winter 2022.

**MELISSSA BIRCH**, Management & Entrepreneurship, published a chapter, "Paraguay and Mercosur: Unlocking Global Potential in a Regional Trade Agreement?", in Barbara A. Ganson (ed.), *Native Peoples, Politics, and Society in Contemporary Paraguay: Multidisciplinary Perspectives* (University of New Mexico, 2021).

CHRIS BROWN, Geography & Atmospheric Science, published two articles: S. De Oliveira Folharini, S. Nogueira De Melo, R. Guimarães Ramos, & J. He is currently working as an international partner on a project funded by Brazilian federal and state funding agencies to study land use and land cover change dynamics in the Amazon portion of the state of Maranhão. This is a partnership

among the State University of Campinas (UNICAMP), State University of Maranhão, Cardiff, and KU.

JAMES BUTLER, Geology, received an Excellence Award in Interdisciplinary Scholarship from the Michigan State University chapter of Phi Kappa Phi.

**HUI CAI**, Architecture, was appointed to full professor.

**YI-YANG CHEN**, Piano, performed nine major national solo and seven collaborative and chamber music performances. He conducted fourteen masterclasses nationally and adjudicated nine international and national competitions. Chen also hosted the 2022 Inaugural Asian Classical Music Initiative International Conference. He is a recipient of the 2021 and 2022 Hall Center Research Grant.

**SUNYOUNG CHEONG**, Visual Arts, was appointed to assistant professor of Metalsmithing/Jewelry.

HYESUN CHO, Curriculum & Teaching, published two books: H, Cho, R. Al-Samiri, & J. Gao, Transnational Language Teacher Identities in TESOL: Identity Construction Among Female International in the U.S. (Routledge, Students 2022) and H, Cho, & K. Song, (eds.), Korean as a Heritage Language from and Translanguaging Transnational Perspectives (Routledge, 2022). She is also a co-PI for a national grant, PEACE (Promoting English Learners' Academic Achievement and Cultivating

Educational Equity through Professional Development). This 5-year federal grant will prepare preservice and inservice teachers in Kansas to better work with English learners through equity-focused pedagogical practices. Cho continues to serve as co-conference chair for the Korean American Educational Researchers' Association.

**KELLY CHONG**, Sociology, co-authored (with Miri Song) an article, "Interrogating the 'White-Leaning' Thesis on White/ Asian Multiracials," in *Social Sciences* 11, no. 13 (2022). She was also awarded a Hall Center Scholars On Site Fund for her documentary, "Invisibility and Rage: Asian Americans, Racial Trauma, and Mental Health."

**BRAD COKELET**, Philosophy, completed his manuscript, "The Emerging Science of Virtue," under contract with Cambridge University Press. He also presented lectures at the University of Chicago, Edinburgh University, and University of Mississippi. He was appointed to the Committee on Asian Philosophies and Philosophers by the American Philosophic Association.

ALEXANDER DIENER, Geography & Atmospheric Science, was awarded a residential fellowship at the University of Connecticut's Humanities Institute for 2023-2024.

MAKI KANEKO, Art History, was awarded a residential fellowship from





**KEITH MCMAHON**, East Asian Languages & Culture, published his seventh book, *Saying All That Can Be Said: The Art of Describing Sex in Jin Ping* Mei (Harvard Asia Center, 2023)

**AMY MCNAIR**, Art History, was invited to give the keynote lecture to announce the acquisition of the Lo Chia-Lun Calligraphy Collection at the University of Michigan Museum of Art. "Liang Shicheng and Xuanhe Catalogue of Paintings," her study of the controversial authorship of the 12th-c. imperial painting catalogue, will be published by Harvard Asia Center Publications in September 2023.

YOONMI NAM, Visual Art, had a solo exhibition. "Delivered & Discarded." at grayDUCK Gallery (Austin, TX), an installation of a public art piece titled "Blizz" at H&R Block Artspace Project Wall (Kansas City), and 14 group exhibitions. These exhibitions included a show at Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art (Kansas City) and at other locations such as Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Chicago, and Finland. She was awarded artist residencies at the Studios Inc. (Kansas City), the Lawrence Arts Center, and at the In Cahoots Artist Residency (California). Nam was invited to give artist lectures at University of Oregon, Texas State University, Northeastern Illinois University, and Berea College. Her works were acquired by Fidelity Investments, Thrivent Art Collection, The Free Library of Philadelphia, and Studios Inc.

**STEPHEN POLITZER-AHLES**, Linguistics, has rejoined the KU linguistics department after several years of researching and teaching overseas. He published an article, "Long-lag Identity Priming in the Absence of Long-lag Morphological Priming: Evidence from Mandarin Tone Alternation," in *Glossa: Psycholinguistics*. Additionally, he recieved a Research-Intensive Course Mini-Grant from the KU Center for Undergraduate Research for the course LING 435: Psycholinguistics.

**HYUNJIN SEO**, Journalism, received the Award of Excellence in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion from the University Economic Development Association for her Digital Inclusion Project. She also was project director for the "How the Light Gets In" interactive visual art installation at the Spencer Museum of Art and the Lawrence Public Library.

**KWANGOK SONG**, Curriculum & Teaching, is the co-PI for the PEACE (Promoting English Learners' Academic Achievement and Cultivating Educational Equity through Professional Development) grant project to provide professional development for preservice and inservice teachers and to create online professional development modules for early childhood educators in Kansas.

MAYA STILLER, Art History, won the American Historical Association's 2022 Patricia Buckley Ebrey Prize for her book *Carving Status at Kumgangsan: Elite Graffiti in Premodern Korea.* Additionally, her digital atlas project is now live at www.aaok.info.

**AKIKO TAKEYAMA**, Women, Gender, & Sexuality Studies, was promoted to full professor and published her second book, *Involuntary Consent: The Illusion of Choice in Japan's Adult Video Industry* (Stanford UP, 2023). She also published two book chapters: ne about extramarital romance in contemporary Japan and the other about the contract-making process in Japan's adult entertainment industry. As CEAS Director, she helped KU secure a Department of Education Title VI institutional grant and a Korea Foundation seeded hire. She was also the recipient of a 2023 Hall Center Resident Faculty Fellowship.

HONG VU, Journalism, was a visiting fellow at the Yale Program on Climate Change Communication.

WONG, KETTY Ethnomusicology, presented а paper, "Transnational Cultural Flows in Salsa Dancing: Latino Musical Migrations in China," at the 71st Midwest Conference on Asian Affairs in September 2022. She received a Hall Center Summer Research Travel Grant to conduct research at the Library of Congress in summer 2023. She also coordinated and published a CD with the chamber music of Luis Humberto Salgado, a collective project recorded by the School of Music Kansas Virtuosi.

FAYE XIAO, East Asian Languages & Cultures, edited a special issue of Chinese Literature Today, which included her research article "Caring for the Small: Gendered Resistance and Solidarity through Chinese Domestic Workers' Writings," 10, no. 2 (July 2021). She also published a journal article, "'This Is the Way I See the World': Re-Visioning 'Leftover Woman' and Female Gaze in Send Me to the Clouds," in Asian Cinema 32, no. 2 (Oct. 2021). She chaired two panels at the 71st Midwest Conference on Asian Affairs and gave a series of invited talks at American Comparative Literature Association's annual conference, Temple University, American Philosophical Society, New Books Network, CEAS Global Asia Speaker Series, and Lawrence Public Library.

**KYOIM YUN**, East Asian Languages & Cultures, received the Keeler Professorship from the KU Department of Geography and Atmospheric Science.

JACK ZHANG, Political Science, published (with Rigao Liu and Samantha Vortherms) an article, "In the Middle: American Multinationals in China and

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Trade War Politics," in *Business and Politic* (2022). He was awarded the KU J. Michael Young Academic Advisor Award and received a Mercatus Center Academic Collaboration Grant. He was also a visiting scholar at Korea University and a Big XII Faculty Fellow at the University of Austin.

JIE ZHANG, Linguistics, continued his NSF-funded research with colleagues in Hong Kong, Taiwan, and Kansas to investigate the production and perception processing of tonal alternation in Chinese dialects. Two articles from the project appeared in the Journal of Neurolinguistics and Neuropsychologia in the last year. His collaborations with KU students and alumni on Chinese phonotactics. Chinese spoken word production. Brazilian Portuguese vowel representation, and the perception of fricative resulted in a number of journal publications and conference presentations. He also gave keynote speeches at the 28th annual meeting of the International Association of Chinese Linguistics and the 34th North American Conference on Chinese Linguistics (Bloomington, IN) on the experimental studies of Chinese tone.

YANG BING ZHANG. Communication Studies, published five journal articles presented multiple times and at maior national and international communication conferences for the 2022-23 academic year. She continues to serve on the Executive Board of International Association of Language and Social Psychology and the review board for five journals in the field of communication studies. Her other major activities include vice chair and unit planner for Intergroup Communication of ICA, graduate director and member of the Advisory committee in Communication Studies, and member of the Advisory Committee at the Center of East Asian Studies at KU.

## FACULTY SPOTLIGHT YANG BING ZHANG PROFESSOR, COMMUNICATION STUDIES



Dr. Yan Bing Zhang is a Professor and Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of Communication Studies at the University of Kansas. Dr. Zhang is an intergroup and intercultural communication scholar. She studies the dynamic interplay between communication, relationships, social cognition, culture, and identity in face-to-face and mediated contexts. Her publications have appeared in U.S. and international communication studies and social psychology journals. This past academic year, Dr. Zhang had ten journal articles accepted or published by scholarly journals, including Language Sciences, International Journal of Communication, Communication Studies, Management Communication Quarterly, and Societies. The Communication and Aging Division of the National Communication Association

recognized her scholarship with the 2021 Giles-Nussbaum Distinguished Scholar Award.

In line with Dr. Zhang's research agenda, her graduate supervision and teaching has focused on three primary areas: (1) culture and communication, (2) quantitative research method and statistics, and (3) communication and intergroup and intercultural relations. Her commitment to and excellence in teaching and mentorship has been recognized numerous times by the University of Kansas and most recently by the International Association for Language and Social Psychology with the 2020 Howie Giles Mentorship Award. Dr. Zhang currently serves as chair of the Intergroup Committee of the International Communication Association and continues to serve on the editorial boards of several communication journals and the executive board of the International Association of Language and Social Psychology.

Dr. Zhang has been a core member affiliated with the KU Center for East Asian Studies for almost twenty years and has served on its advisory committee multiple times. Her most recent term ended in May 2023. In addition to serving on the advisory committee, Dr. Zhang was a member of the Center's 2022-23 Steering Committee on Public Health along with Drs. Ayako Mizumura, Changming Duan, Hui Cai, and Brad Cokelet. The committee developed year-long programming for CEAS's Title VI grant, including the Global Asia Speaker Series, the fall Public Health Film Series, and the spring Public Health Symposium. Dr. Zhang chaired the panel, "Disability at Work: Examining the Intersections of Disability Accommodation, Media Representation, Culture, and Education."

#### Why did you choose your degree program and KU?

#### How has the fellowship helped you attain your academic goals?

As I look back, the whole idea and application process seemed like a whirlwind, but afterwards I found myself in Japan participating in not only a summer program but a year-long intensive program as well. This allowed me to improve my language skills and meet people from all over the world!

#### Why is it important to learn another language?

The importance of learning another language lies not only in the ability to change how your brain thinks but also in the ability to understand a new culture. By learning a new language, you are then able to process it in both your native and second language. You may then be able to contemplate any cultural differences between the translations. Let's not forget, you can also expand the number of people with whom you can converse

## What advice do you have for students who want to learn a new language?

Do not be afraid to take the plunge. It may seem like an insurmountable challenge but that's all the more reason to do it. When you actually make progress, and trust me with enough time and commitment you will, it will be all the more rewarding. Just be patient and find a method of study you enjoy, one that will propel you even further!

## What would you say to students who want to apply for the FLAS fellowship?

Apply! I was extremely nervous that I wouldn't receive the FLAS Fellowship. I had just transferred to KU, and it was my first year there. I was able to write a successful application with the help of my advisors and further cultivate my academic studies in Japan. You can have this sort of experience too, don't hesitate!

# ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

### GABRIEL REBECK INTERNATONAL PROGRAM MANAGER B.A., EAST ASIAN LANGUAGES & CULTURES, 2008 B.A., FILM & MEDIA STUDIES, 2008



I had my first transformative experience in Japan at 13 years old when esteemed KU CEAS alum, Dianne Daugherty, invited me on a homestay to Gunma Prefecture. In Maebashi, I crossed paths with an assistant language teacher on the JET Program. I decided then and there that I would join JET after graduating. I studied Japanese and film at KU and gained another mentor in the process, Dr. Michael Baskett. He bridged my two fields of interest perfectly.

JET sent me to a paradise beach in Kagoshima Prefecture where I taught English for three years in a tiny town of farmers and fishermen. In search of a new challenge after JET, I moved up to Nagoya in Aichi Prefecture and became a personnel manager for the Corporate Relations

Division of a company called ECC Foreign Language Institute. I was the only foreigner in an office of salesmen. They took me on sales calls, and I used Japanese all day every day. I learned so much about how Japanese companies work by observing from the inside.

After ten years in Japan, I interviewed with a non-profit group, called the Laurasian Institution, in Tokyo. They wanted me in the Seattle office so I moved back to the United States. Today, with Laurasian, I have the honor of facilitating international exchange programs between the U.S. and Japan. Collaborating closely with organizations like the U.S. State Department, the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Japan Foundation, KAKEHASHI, and others, we work to foster lasting friendships through grassroots-level programs of academic exchange. Drawing upon all my experiences from my time as an exchange student to my understanding of Japanese corporate culture from my "salaryman" years, I effectively communicate with our partners to make it possible for us to run our programs.

I couldn't have accomplished any of this without the knowledge I gained in my years at KU, especially the support I received from my teachers. It is both an honor and a privilege to empower and guide young people in our programs at Laurasian who, like I once did, yearn to reach beyond themselves and their home country to cultivate meaningful connections with the wider world. 

# 71ST MCAA

Midwest Conference on Asia Affairs

The 71st Midwest Conference on Asian Affairs (MCAA) took place September 16-18, 2022, at the Kansas Student Union. The MCCA, founded in 1952, has a long relationship with the University of Kansas and has held six of its annual conferences at KU (1953, 1956, 1967, 1974, 1983, and 2014). The center was delighted to host it again this year. It was the first in-person conference since 2019, due to the COVID pandemic. Participants from 25 states and 8 countries attended.

The MCAA kept common program offerings. A total of 9 concurrent sessions with 5 to 7 panels of paper presentations or roundtable sessions over three days provided varied opportunities for all participants to exchange ideas and learn from new or ongoing research. A reception, featuring KU Asian student organizations and alumni, was held on Friday to conclude the first day of the conference and included music, dance, and other performances. A presidential luncheon and panel, "Global Asia and Science, Technology, Environment, and Medicine," and an awards banquet with keynote address by Kamran Asdar Ali (University of Texas-Austin), "Female Desire, Forbidden Love and Forgotten Archives: Sexual Politics in 1960s Pakistani Cinema," were held on Saturday. Unique to this year's MCAA, there were three special guided tours highlighting KU's East Asian Collections at the Spencer Research Museum, Spencer Museum of Art, and East Asian Library.

The 2022 MCAA made a concerted effort to focus on the needs of graduate students, who made up 70% of attendees. It held two graduate workshops, "Demystifying Academic Book Publication," with Joyce Harrison, editor in chief of KU Press, and "Career Exploration and Planning Tools," with Nicole Reitz from the KU Office of Graduate Studies. There was also a virtual roundtable with Asian Studies Acquisition and Series editors. A special reception for graduate students was held prior to the banquet.

# JAPANESE OUTREACH

Thanks to the Japan Outreach Initiative (JOI) sponsored by the Japan Foundation and Laurasian Institution, the center was able to host a Japanese outreach coordinator, Yoshie Hisatomi, this academic year. She has been an amazing asset to our community outreach with over 35 events. We asked her to share highlights from her activities.

## **Juvenile Detention Center Classes**

Teaching my culture at the Douglas County Juvenile Detention Center presented several challenges, but I imagined what it might mean to them to learn about Japan, The beauty and spirit behind my culture was engaging for them, and we built close connections through discussions about Japanese customs. As a special exception, I was given permission by the staff to bring in certain items to enhance their experience. Their favorite was by far the traditional Japanese Yukata and Geta garments, which the students were allowed to try on. Their faces lit up with emotion as we learned messages from Japanese songs too, especially "Sukiyaki," by Kyu Sakamoto, and "My Way," by Def Tech. For me, Japanese radio exercises with the students were the highlight of very week! We started this way every Thursday for three months. With sparkling eyes, they would ask, "Are you coming back next week?" I will never forget the way they made me feel, seeing them waving their arms as I turned to leave for the day. What a memorable time!

## **Community Cooking Classes**

One of the most important things I want to do as a coordinator is to introduce Japan's food culture. Food has a way of unlocking the stories behind cultures, connecting people from different backgrounds. My four classes included comfort food (rice balls and miso soup), popular breads (melon pan and butter roll sandwiches), home cooking (korokke, rice, and salads), and sweets (strawberry mochi and matcha). These cooking classes have been very successful! It has been rewarding to see the wide range of age groups attending my class, and the sessions always brought laughs, smiles, and vibrant conversations about Japan. I try to present unique aspects of Japanese food culture along with the preparation itself. Our discussions include culture, customs, table manners, lifestyles, and traditional presentation.

## Lawrence-Hiratsuka Sister Cities

I was delighted to be part of the sister cities program because I knew how a piece of international experience could open new doors to students' lives in many different ways. The students were amazing, preparing themselves for their upcoming Japanese adventure. We made great progress during our 5-hour Sunday sessions through engaging language and culture classes, dividing our time between lectures, discussions, and student presentations. They learned a lot and had a blast at the same time! They also created brochures that advertised their favorite parts of Lawrence to welcome incoming Japanese exchange students. I am so proud of these young representatives!
